Headmaster's Introduction

The purpose of this 'Academic Highlights' booklet is to catalogue the academic achievements of our pupils and demonstrate the breadth of academic opportunities at the School, in addition to the breath-taking range of Co-curricular activities.

RGS Worcester achieves superb results at A Level, GCSE, BTEC/CTEC and in the EPQ (Extended Project Qualification). **RGS achieved the best A Level results in the area** again this year. Our pupils go on to the leading Universities in the UK and abroad, including a number to Oxford and Cambridge Universities. They also achieve places on other highly competitive courses including Higher Level Apprenticeships in a range of different professions at international companies such as Deloitte, the BBC, Gowling WLG, Ernst & Young, Aston Martin, Rolls-Royce, HS2 and Jaguar Land Rover. **In the summer 2023, over 90% of our students achieved their first-choice University places.**

Above all, our pupils **achieve very significant Value-Added scores**, demonstrating that teaching and learning at RGS Worcester brings the best out of each child. The teachers really do prepare the pupils very well and encourage them to aim high, within a supportive environment where every child matters. They have a very broad range of subjects to choose from so they can play to their strengths, study what they love and set themselves up for the future. Alongside their academic work, they receive expert Careers advice and guidance from specialists to support them in their choices.

The academic success of a school can be read in results tables and RGS leapt 20 places this year at A Level, but these do not demonstrate the love of learning developed in the pupils or the opportunities to be inspired in academic work both in and outside the classroom. This document includes the results but also attempts to **demonstrate ways in which our pupils are inspired in their studies**. From Science Olympiads, the Maths Challenge and essay-writing competitions to Greenpower racing and Young Fashion Designer UK, to LAMDA Drama, musicals and performances, concerts and ensembles, our pupils participate in local, national and international competitions and really enjoy the academic challenge!

A LEVEL & BTEC/CTEC: Superb results for the Upper Sixth Students

Sixth Form students celebrated superb results this summer. Their exceptional A Level results, measured by the percentage of A*, A*-A, and A*-B grades, have demonstrated RGS Worcester's position as the leader in Worcester with the best A Level results in the area*. This accomplishment is all the more significant as it comes from the largest Upper Sixth cohort ever. Over half of the Grades were A*/A with 20% at A* and over 80% of Grades were A*-B, making these amongst RGS's best ever examined results. We were delighted to see the students achieve their offers for Universities and other courses including Higher Level Apprenticeships, after such strong results at A Level, BTEC and EPQ. Over 90% of the students achieved their first-choice University places which was exceptional.

In a year marked by heightened competition due to the enduring effects of the Pandemic, our students have demonstrated hard work, ability and exceptional resilience. Despite a decrease nationally in the number of students securing spots at their top-choice universities compared to the previous year, RGS Worcester's students continued to shine.

Headmaster, John Pitt, commented: "I am so pleased that our students achieved such excellent examination results and their chosen destinations. I know the pressure of these exams (as a parent and as Head this year) and particularly for this Year group who did not sit GCSEs because of the Pandemic. I am so pleased they did so well and surpassed all pre-Pandemic results. They were a superb Year group and our biggest ever – they will go on to achieve great things – many congratulations!"

Based on A rate, A*/A rate and A-B rate, all measures used in school league tables. In The Daily Telegraph League Table, RGS Worcester rose 20 places to 85th in the country, well ahead of local competition.

Individual successes:

Ben Sears achieved a Choral Scholarship in addition to his place to read Law at Cambridge University. Ben performed in the local WODYS production of 'Carousel' at the Swan Theatre over the summer and is an expert actor, singer and dancer who has starred in many RGS Worcester productions and concerts. He achieved A*A*A*A grades in four A Levels: Economics, Maths, Politics and Religious Studies.

School Captain Ollie Blunt achieved A*A*A* and the top A grade in AS Level Further Maths. Ollie is going on to study Biochemistry at Bath University where he is looking forward to continuing to play rugby alongside his degree studies.

Kitty Smith achieved A*A*A* grades in Biology, Chemistry, Maths and Psychology and is reading Medicine at Birmingham University. Kitty was the lead Cadet in the Combined Cadet Force.

Twins Isaac and Lucas Pepper are both going to study Law at University having achieved their offers at Birmingham City and Gloucestershire Universities respectively. Isaac studied Classics, Politics and PE A Levels and Lucas studied Business, Geography and Politics.

Twins Ben and Emily Weller achieved excellent results and their first-choice Universities. Ben achieved 3A* grades in Biology, Chemistry and Maths and is reading Biology at Birmingham University. Emily achieved A* and A grades in Textiles and Geography A Levels and the top Distinction* grade in CTEC Business and is reading Fashion Design at Loughborough University.

GB athlete Alex Houchin, who competed and won a medal in the European Championships in Israel this summer at Under 20 level, achieved A*AB A Levels in Business, Politics and PE. Alex is a 400 metre and 4x400 metre relay champion.

Loïc Keasey is pursuing his professional Rugby career with Ealing Trailfinders, building upon his caps for the Under 18 England Rugby team. Loïc completed the BTEC National Diploma for Sport and CTEC Business both with Distinctions.

Siân Gaynor-Smith sat her A Levels in the most challenging of circumstances as her father, local Malvern lawyer Edward Gaynor-Smith, was suffering from a terminal illness. Siân showed incredible strength to complete all of her exams and achieved A*AA in Business, Geography and Psychology A Levels. She is going to Cardiff University to study Criminology and we all wish her and her family well.

Rowing champion Menna Sutton achieved excellent results in Chemistry, Maths and Physics while trialling at National level in Rowing and competing for RGS. The successful Rowing Boys' Quad of Tobey Butler, Ben Koutrouki, Harry Rutter and Matt Smith compiled 13 A Levels between them with 8 at A*/A grades, while competing all around the country this summer.

In the BTEC (National Diploma in Sport) and the CTEC (Business) all of the pupils achieved Distinction*, Distinction or Merit. These are equivalent to A*, A and C grades respectively at A Level.

Guide to BTEC and CTEC results

The high coursework element in BTECs and CTECs makes the qualification a more preferable choice for those whose learning style complements continual assessment rather than end-of-year assessment. These qualifications provide a valid route into University education.

GCSE: RGS pupils are now ready for the next challenge

Excellent GCSE results were celebrated this summer at RGS Worcester to the delight of staff, parents and pupils. With dedication, perseverance, and a commitment to excellence, the Year Eleven pupils achieved more top Grade 9s than ever before.

19% of all Grades were top Grade 9s (against 4.9% nationally) and nearly 60% of all Grades were 9-7 (A**, A* or A equivalent).

With so much subject choice, including GCSEs in Engineering, Greek, PE and Textiles, pupils are able to choose the subjects they most enjoy and play to their strengths.

John Pitt, Headmaster, commented: "It was lovely to see the pupils so pleased with their GCSE results. We had our largest GCSE Year group ever and we were particularly pleased by the number achieving the top Grade 9 across the different subjects which was significantly above the prepandemic level. This was in spite of the press telling us the results would be back to 2019 levels. The pupils can now look forward to the Sixth Form and all the opportunities available at RGS. Very well done to all of the pupils for their hard work. I would also like to thank their teachers who have supported the pupils so well."

Congratulations to Abigail Crabbe, Elizabeth Crookall, Jaimie Lee and Sam Taylor who achieved straight sets of Grade 9s in their ten GCSE subjects. 

Key Performance Indicators

Key Performance Indicators are a type of performance measurement that help you understand how an organisation is performing, and allows you to understand if you are heading in the right direction with your strategy.

For educational institutions, Key Performance Indicators might include percentage of A* or A grades at A Level, the percentage of grades 9-7 at GCSE and the Department of Education educational performance data.

Below are graphs that show the trend in examination results at both GCSE and A Level, at RGS Worcester and nationally, following the education reforms of 2016. 2022 and 2023 saw a return to examined grades replacing the assessed grades of 2019 and 2020.

The graphs demonstrate that RGS pupils consistently perform very significantly above natural averages at both GCSE and A Level, proving the Value-Added of our teaching.

In The Daily Telegraph Independent Schools' A Level league table, RGS Worcester was ranked 85th Nationally, **the number 1 school in Worcestershire** and the 3rd ranked school in the wider West Midlands area - an impressive outcome indeed!

The Sunday Times

The Sunday Times Parent Power guide identifies the highest-achieving schools in the United Kingdom, ranked by recent examination results at both GCSE and A Level.

In the most recent edition, RGS Worcester is **ranked 1st** of all co-educational independent day schools (age range 11-18) in Worcestershire, and the **highest ranked school in Worcester**, as well as being placed 6th in the West Midlands.

Department for Education's Educational Performance Data for A Levels

The Department for Education calculates how much progress pupils who studied academic qualifications at this school made between the end of Key Stage 4 (GCSE) and the end of their academic qualification studies, compared to similar pupils across England.

The scores are calculated by comparing the academic qualifications results of pupils at this school with the academic qualifications results of students in schools and colleges across England who started with similar results at the end of the previous Key Stage. A score above zero means students made more progress, on average, than students across England who got similar results at the end of Key Stage 4. These scores are also known as Value-Added scores.

At RGS, our Sixth Form pupils have achieved significant Value-Added scores. A comparison with local schools can be seen in the schematic below. According to the Department for Education (DfE), RGS pupils achieved above average progress (green), whilst other schools attained either average (amber), below average (orange) or well below average progress (red).
